Unforgiveness that exists beyond today becomes bitterness.
The only reasonable expectations we can have of others are those that they have agreed upon with us."

"Everytime I make an assumption about someone without confirming it with them, I am at risk for believing a lie about this person."
The ultimate solution to conflict is forgiveness. If the parties have communicated, then forgiveness given and received, is the key way conflict can be resolved.
Often we compartmentalize Loving God and Loving Our Neighbour, Matthew 22:37-40 makes clear that we must love God AND love our Neighbour (it is two sides of the same coin).

Transformative Internal Inquiries
How do I know if I am bitter or not? Have I left it behind and let it go, or am I still hanging on to it? Is it still occupying my thoughts, heart and mind? Do I want the best for them, or do I want them to "pay"?
"Why is it that so many of us Christians often make such lousy human beings? Why are we so judgemental, defensive, and touchy?"
Can you say to yourself, and about THAT person: "It is good that you exist"?
Am I willing to forgive unconditionally, and pay the price of that emotional pain, so that both of us can be free?

Excerpt from Emotionally Healthy Relationships Day by Day

Author Richard Rohr has written a lovely prayer that shows us how our life with God cannot be separated from our life with others. They really are, as Jesus taught, two sides of the same coin. I invite you to read this prayer slowly, allowing each truth to inform your life and your relationships:

I thank you, Lord Jesus, for becoming a human being so I do not have to pretend or try to be a God.

I thank you, Lord Jesus, for becoming finite and limited so I do not have to pretend that I am infinite and limitless.

I thank you, crucified God, for becoming mortal so I do not have to try to make myself immortal.

I thank you, Lord Jesus, for becoming inferior so I do not have to pretend that I am superior to anyone. . . .

I thank you for becoming weak, so I don't have to be strong.

I thank you for being willing to be considered imperfect and strange, so I do not have to be perfect and normal.

I thank you, Lord Jesus, for being willing to be disapproved of, so I do not have to try so hard to be approved and liked.

I thank you for being considered a failure, so I do not have to give my life trying to pretend I'm a success.

I thank you for being wrong by the standards of religion and state, so I do not have to be right anywhere.

I thank you for being poor in every way, so I do not have to be rich in any way.

I thank you, Lord Jesus, for being all of the things humanity despises and fears, so I can accept myself and others in you.

As Rohr says, we can be thankful for God's call for us "to die" to the manipulative and controlling ways of the world in order to embrace the crucified way of Jesus. Why? Because it is the pathway of Jesus to a life of power and resurrection.
